Level 1 Some GCSE study, E2FEE or Foundation Studies needed (Specific subjects may be required)	Foundation Learning Foundation Diploma BTEC level 1	GCSEs – Grades 1-3
Level 2 Usually minimum of 2 GCSEs grade 3+ or Level 1 qualification needed (Specific subjects may be required)	Usually 1 year BTEC First Diploma Extended Certificate level 2	GCSEs – 4 or more grade 4-9
Level 3 4-6 GCSEs grade 4+or a Level 2 qualification (Specific subjects may be required)	BTEC National/Extended level 3 T-Levels (80% theory, 20% industry experience)	AS/A Levels

Education – 6th form:

- A-Z selection of A'Levels in subjects ranging from Art and Design to Spanish! Some other Level 3 courses available e.g. Health and Social Care
- Choose 3-4 subjects opportunity to study subjects in more depth + enrichment activities available
- 2 year programme
- Level 3 qualification need high at 5+ GCSE grades (4-9 grades)
- A good route to university, but not the only route
- Choose carefully if you have a career and/or university course in mind!
- Check individual 6th forms for courses available!

Education - College:

 Mostly Vocational (job-related) courses available at all levels (Level 1+) - e.g. BTEC Diplomas. Best option if you know the general career area you wish to follow.

Variety of subject areas available including:

Art and Design Catering

Beauty Travel and Tourism

Business Admin ICT
Health and Social Care Media


Engineering Hospitality

Photography Public Services

Construction

- Some colleges offer a variety of A'Levels
- New T-Level qualification available (Level 3, 80% theory, 20% placement minimum)



Education – College (continued)

T-Level subjects available:

- •Building Services Engineering for Construction.
- •Design, Surveying and Planning for Construction.
- •Digital Business Services.
- Digital Production, Design and Development.
- •Digital Support Services.
- •Education and Childcare.
- •Health.
- •Healthcare Science.

Check with individual colleges/providers which subject areas are available!

Nearby choices:

E.g. Cirencester College, Gloucestershire College, SGS College, City of Bristol College, New College (Swindon).



Apprenticeships

(What do you know?)



Apprenticeships (Work based training):

- Combination of Employment and Study ('Earn while you Learn') available to 16+ after completing GCSEs
- Two ways to apply:
 - 1. Apply directly to a company for an advertised vacancy
 - 2. Apply to college for training, but you will need to find an employer. Support/vacancy database often available
- Apprenticeship Minimum Wage (April 2022+) –
 16-17 year olds: £4.81 p/h; 18-20 year olds: £6.83 p/h
- Intermediate (Level 2) 12-18 months to complete. Entry criteria varies often 2+ GCSEs including maths and English
- Advanced (Level 3) 24 months to complete.
 Entry criteria varies 5 GCSEs grade 4-9 including maths
- Degree level apprenticeships available gain a full undergraduate or master's degree while you work. 3-6 years to complete, depending on the course level.



Other training options:

- Foundation Learning (Level 1)
- This is for students who achieve very few GCSEs at low grades. Programmes include literacy and numeracy, work related training, and key skills, all to a Level 1 (D-G GCSE equivalent)
- Progression on to an Intermediate (NVQ2) apprenticeship or Level 2 College programme available.

Financial matters....



16-19 Financial Support

The Student Bursary Fund is available (up to £1,200 per year). This is means tested and not available to everyone.

Students who fall in to the following groups will be eligible:

- Children in Care
 - Care leavers
- Those receiving Income Support

Always check with individual providers if you think you may be eligible




Checklist...

- Autumn term year 11 onwards....
- Find out mock results/predicted GCSE grades to help you plan ahead
- Think about your post 16 options what would suit you best? Do you have a career in mind?
- Research courses and your ideas thoroughly!
- Research and attend open events for 6th forms/colleges of your choice and check deadline dates for applications
- Check GCSE entry requirements for specific courses
- Apply asap in year 11!
