History


Key Stage 3

History students at Key Stage 3 are able to experience oy the richness and diversity of British and world history from the Iron Age to the end of the Cold War. Students gain a knowledge of the history of our island and why our history has been shaped in the way it has. Students will also gain an understanding of pan-European and worldwide trends and ideologies, together with key turning points and a foundation in understanding differences between political systems.



Homework – what to expect

- Teachers have shared homework timetables with students and they should also have written the days they have homework onto their exercise books
- Homework timetables are on the school website
- Homework is distributed evenly over the week, students will need to complete between one and two pieces each evening Monday - Friday.



Organisation

- Core subjects set one homework per week
- Other subjects set one homework per fortnight
- Homework timetable aims to balance tasks across the fortnight for students

Completion of Homework

- Students should spend **no more than 30 minutes on each piece of homework**. If they find they have not completed the task after 30 minutes they should draw a line where they got to and write '30 minutes'.
- Teachers usually set consolidation work, reading and comprehension tasks, research or revision of key vocabulary and knowledge for quizzes.
- Students should be able to complete their homework without help from home. If you find this is not the case, please encourage them to email their class teacher or write a note in their exercise book so their teacher is aware.

Feedback in lessons

Teachers will.....

- Check in on students as they are working, asking them questions and seeking clarification of their understanding;
- Provide live feedback in lessons and give pupils time to improve their work in green pen;
- Provide opportunities for pupils to self and peer assess work in green pen;
- Provide written feedback on **blue stickers**, in line with department feedback policies.

Pupils should....

- Engage with feedback by using green pen to improve or redraft their work;
- Assess their own work against the learning intentions and the success criteria, and improve their work using green pen;
- Ask questions in lessons when called upon to do so. This helps teachers to identify learning trouble spots and address misconceptions.

Personal Development at KLB

Personal development isn't just "taught" in PSHE lessons and tutor time, instead it is more about the experiences and opportunities that students will encounter to build their character and develop their unique identities.

We build personal development into our curriculum lessons, whole school events, assemblies and enrichment activities that take place throughout their time with us at KLB.








Universal Support
