On a rather soggy Friday in April, instead of going to school, we headed to the Ridgeway near Swindon, to set off on our Silver DofE practice expedition. I was a bit apprehensive about the trip as I had looked at the weather forecast for the weekend and knew it was going to be much colder than what we had experienced on our first expedition. This would be the opposite extreme of when our expedition was postponed last year due to a heatwave. I was also thinking about whether it would be more challenging to camp for two nights rather than just the one that we did last time.

Our first challenge was that we were a team member down so we all ended up having to carry more kit than we were expecting. We



worked as a team to distribute the kit between us, reviewed the route on the maps, then set off in our waterproofs. Unfortunately, because of the rain, we couldn't appreciate the scenery and views as much as we would have liked but it was good to be outdoors instead of a normal day in KLB! Throughout the day, we enjoyed some of our copious amounts of snacks (one of our team brought 16 wraps to eat!).

We arrived at camp in the afternoon and pitched our tents. It was a lot easier this time as we had all done the bronze expedition, so we had a good understanding of how to set up our equipment quickly and efficiently. It was good to get our bags off our backs and relax with some warm food we cooked with the stoves.

I was surprised to wake up in the morning to find our tent covered in frost as I hadn't been too cold during the night. We packed up our camp and set off again. The weather was an improvement from the first day - I even got a little sunburnt. The walking on the second day was more enjoyable thanks to the better weather, but some of our team struggled with blisters so others supported by helping to carry some of their kit for a while. We persevered, eventually managing to navigate to the second night's campsite. Everyone was feeling a bit more weary so we were grateful to get into our sleeping bags at night.

The next morning, we packed up our tents for the last time, looking forward to the prospect of getting home. Some of our team were still having challenges but the DofE leaders were really helpful, helping our team to reach the finish point.



The silver DofE practice expedition was done between Wantage and Lambourn and in total was 50 kilometres spread over three days with 22km the first day 18km the next and a shorter walk on the last day of only 10km. The area was beautiful with lots of rapeseed fields in full bloom; most of the walk was through fields and hills with small section of woodland or towns.

We were sharing a camp with groups from Stroud High School and had a few interesting conversations with them as we were in the camp for a few hours before he had to go to bed at 8:30. The first night was incredibly cold: we were told it got down to -2C, which caused a 32.1 mi Silver Dofe ⊘

layer of ice to form over the tent and the ground outside. The ice was still there when we woke up at 6:30; however, due to the low light pollution in the area the sky was clear and we could see the milky way which was definitely a highlight of the trip.

On the second day, despite an hour-long delay at one of the checkpoints, we all made it to the camp in good time. The second night was a lot warmer but was rainy throughout the evening. Overall, the walk was really enjoyable and I had an amazing time with my group both whilst we were walking but also at the camp.

The department started this group in January to give Year 9 students interested in drama the opportunity to go through a series of devising workshops before creating their own performance from their ideas. The students explored various stimuli and used both naturalistic and non-naturalistic forms to generate practical material from their interpretations.



The students worked really well together and elected to stay as one larger group rather than separate smaller groups. They focused on the theme of 'loneliness' and decided to chart the story of a family divided and reunited by war. They were ambitious in their use of set, lighting and costume to support their story, which they shared for one night only in the Drama Studio to friends and family. Year 11 Performance Exam



For Component 2 of their GCSE, drama students are required to explore a script in preparation for a visiting examiner. This was the first year since COVID that students have had to deliver two extracts from the script rather than one. This can be done either as a performer or a designer. It was an intense period of preparation and quite a stressful day for the students, but they handled the occasion brilliantly and showcased the skill and creativity they have honed during their years at KLB. We were immensely proud of them all.

Frantic Assembly Workshop

Drama students in Years 10 and 12 had an amazing opportunity to work with a London practitioner from the international physical theatre company, Frantic Assembly. As we have featured the company in our teaching and have run trips to some of Frantic Assembly's professional productions, we were excited to bring their work directly to students on our turf.




Year 10 Geography Fieldtrip to Lyme Regis




On Wednesday 29 March, we had a geography fieldtrip to Lyme Regis. The aim was to find out if the coastal defences were effective at preventing erosion and longshore drift. It was very cold and wet the entire day so our record of data was limited.

First, we went to the sea wall at the east side of the beach to do a field sketch of Black Venn. We then discussed the erosional processes and landforms. As the rain was getting heavier, we then measured the beach profiles using a clinometer (to measure angle) and ranging poles. We also collected pebble data.

Although our time was limited due to the heavy rain and strong winds, we were able to ask local business owners about the sea defences. Even though the weather was unpleasant, we managed to collect the data we needed and enjoyed our time in Lyme Regis.










Sikh Visitor to Years 8 and 9 Students




Chinese Chopsticks


Art Department News







We have all Christopher's books in the library by the issue desk for students to enjoy. Come and have a look, and see if you would like to borrow any of them!



Grenade by Alan Gratz


