A level History Trip to Berlin

During half term, A level history students went to Berlin to enrich their study of 20th century German history. It truly was an enlightening experience, to have the famous sights of Berlin, steeped with so much history, be realised before our eyes.



Monday: Sachsenhausen and Wannsee House

After the first day of travel and becoming accustomed to Berlin, we headed to our first place of interest, Sachsenhausen Concentration Camp. Although we had learned about the persecution of the Jewish people, seeing where it happened and reading the many stories on the information boards really made us think of the horrors that had taken place where we were standing. The museum allowed us to see the buildings that would have been used during the period the Nazis were in power such as the kitchen, the infirmary, the barracks and lastly Station Z. This was the chamber used for the killing and incinerating of the prisoners held at Sachsenhausen. After this harrowing experience, the teachers praised us for our behavior and appropriate conduct whilst in the camp.

Our next destination was the House of Wannsee, where the Final Solution was discussed and then signed.

Tuesday: Holocaust memorial and free time

Our next day in Berlin consisted of visiting the Memorial to the Murdered Jews; large stone-like structures of varying heights. These stones were meant to make us feel lost as we walked through them, reflecting on our time at the concentration camp the day before. We then headed to the Brandenburg Gate, led by our very kind tour guide, who informed us of the Gate's significance to Germany and how it represents its past. Just behind the gate was the Reichstag building which we would be entering the next day. After this, we headed over to take pictures and browse the gift shop at Checkpoint Charlie (the famous place where American and Russian tanks would face off), before visiting the Topography of Terror. Then, we spent time in the Mall of Berlin as well as in Rausch Chocolatiers later that day. During the evening we decided to visit the Berlin TV tower; we were able to see all the monuments we had seen earlier.



Wednesday: Palace of Tears and Reichstag Dome

Our last day in Berlin was spent visiting the Palace of Tears, a border crossing between East and West Berlin, where we were lucky enough to have a guided tour. We then visited the Reichstag building, more specifically the large dome on the top of the building. The views from here were amazing, even through the rain.

Our visit to Sachsenhausen concentration camp struck a chord with many of us. There was a complete change in atmosphere when we arrived: it felt colder, bleaker, as if the ground had been permeated by the horrific acts that happened there. It was chilling to see how the Nazis treated their inmates, worse than animals. We then visited the House of Wansee, where the Nazis decided on the Final Solution, and it was hard to fathom how such an evil act could have taken place in such a beautiful house. Reading the transcript from the Wansee Conference emphasised how utterly heartless this decision was; how the loss of human lives was treated as a matter of procedure, necessary for the protection of German people.

We also went inside the Libeskind Jewish Museum, which had sharp, angular walls and concrete 'voids' to create disconcerting spaces. This resulted in an emotional, sensorial journey through Jewish history, as opposed to a conventional museum set-up. The 'memory void' exhibit was especially hard-hitting: a floor lined with 10,000 screaming faces to commemorate the Holocaust victims, designed to be walked on. No matter how lightly you tread, you could hear the metal screaming beneath your feet, which put you in the position of a

perpetrator, or one of the many who stayed complicit during the Nazi regime. My personal trip-highlight was the walking tour of the city centre with a local historian. We visited key sights such as the Brandenburg Gate and the Memorial to the Murdered Jews in Europe. I found the book burning memorial at Bebelplatz particularly moving.



The memorial consisted of a sunken library, devoid of books with the inscription, 'That was but a prelude; where they burn books, they will ultimately burn people as well' (Heinrich Heine, 1820), which of course later became true. Going up the TV Tower and getting an aerial view of the beautiful cityscape was another highlight, as well as the Reichstag and its spectacular glass dome. All-in-all, this was a fantastic trip with unforgettable experiences – an enormous thank you to all the teachers!

Sixth Form Art Trip



Over the February half term, year 12 and 13 art students visited Liverpool and Manchester with their sketchpads and cameras in hand to make the most of the four-day visit. On the first day, we visited the Barbara Hepworth Museum before going on to The Yorkshire Sculpture Park in Wakefield. Set in the beautiful 500-acre, 18th-century Bretton Hall estate in West Yorkshire, this the leading international centre for modern and contemporary sculpture.

On the second day, we visited the city of Manchester where we went to The Manchester City Art Gallery before going on to The Imperial War Museum and The

Lowry. Students saw major works by one of Britain's most loved artists, LS Lowry, who painted scenes of life in the industrial districts of North West England in the mid-20th century. He developed a distinctive style of painting and is best known for his urban landscapes peopled with human figures, often referred to as matchstick men.





During each visit to galleries and museums, students and staff were busy taking photos and drawing in their sketchpads, which they continued with back at the youth hostel each evening.

The final day was spent in Liverpool, where we visited the World Museum and The Walker Art Gallery, which has one of the most important and renowned painting collections in the UK. The day ended with a relaxed stroll on nearby Crosby Beach, host to a collection of Antony Gormley sculptures in the sand. Despite the cold late afternoon weather, the sun came out to make it a very enjoyable and relaxed end to our time in the North West.

Gold DofE Training Days



Budding Year 9 Japanese Architects

To discover future architects amongst our talented students, one Japanese class in Year 9 were recently set homework to design and or build a Japanese house. Based on images shown in lessons, conversations with teachers who have spent many years living in Japan, and independent research into the topic, they produced some exceptional work.



Of note is Amber Hewitt's sketched design, clearly showing a traditional two-tiered Japanese roof with tile detail. Charlie Garside worked over a few weeks to produce a model of a Japanese house from various materials, showing detail both outside and inside the house.

Concepts about Japanese housing that particularly interested these students were the 'goemomburo', traditional bowl-shaped iron baths heated from below by a fire, found in houses in the Japanese countryside. They were curious about the contrast between modern-style toilets with multiple buttons, including river or bird sounds, and the more traditional squat toilets.

Students were also interested to learn that in many Japanese houses symbols for two religions sit side by side: Shinto (for life) and Buddhism (for death).
